In summary, it states it will Require Oregon Health Authority to deny application for medical marijuana registry identification card if applicant has been convicted of felony involving controlled substance; Prohibit persons convicted of felony involving controlled substance from medical using marijuana registry identification card;



Remember, without the OMMA, all patients would be in violation of the Oregon controlled substances act. Many patients have controlled substance convictions which pre-date the OMMA and which were directly related to their medicinal use.

Be polite, direct and use short sentences.

If you schedule a meeting, be prompt and dress appropriately.

If you can't lobby, come to the hearing to show your opposition to this proposal.

<u>Details</u>: This bill would punish citizens who committed a past felony, but that have served their time, and who are also sick enough become doctor-qualified to use medical marijuana. In this way, the bill seeks to re-punish citizens. This will would create a significant unfunded mandate for background checks on an estimated 80,000 current OMMP cardholders, including caregivers as well as patients. The OMPI estimate for the cost of 80,000 background checks is at least \$7.5 million.

It is unlikely that state agencies could background conduct 75,000 checks without the assistance of law enforcement agencies or private contractors. This would create a significant privacy concern for OMMP cardholders, who currently enjoy privacy unless part of an active criminal investigation. This bill also has a punitive effect on patients who were convicted as drug felons in states with harsh laws; those same patients would have suffered no more than a misdemeanor under Oregon law. For example, Oregon residents can possess not more than one ounce of marijuana and receive only a civil penalty. In other states, the amount needed for a felony conviction is much lower.

The cost of this measure raises the fear of new fees and fee increases for OMMP program members, to pay for background checks. In general, OMMP patients are not able to afford higher fees. 39.4% of OMMP cardholders currently receive a discounted OMMP fee because they are low-income, according to OMMP analysis.

Each speaker called to testify will have two minutes to address the committee. The order of testimony may be managed to ensure that all points of view on these measures are presented.

Staff respectfully requests that you submit 25 collated copies of written materials at the time of your testimony and, if possible, an electronic copy of materials provided to staff 24 hours prior to the meeting. Persons making presentations including the use of video, DVD, PowerPoint or overhead projection equipment are asked to contact committee staff and provide an electronic copy 24 hours prior to the meeting.

Whether you want to testify or not, it would be good to come to Salem for any hearings. It would be especially good to try to schedule a meeting with your Senator -or-Representative before the meeting, possible.

As with coming to court, if you decide to attend hearings, please dress appropriately and be polite and respectful. If you cannot attend, Please write and testify.

<continued from 30 BILLS, page 1 > and Require Oregon Health Authority to conduct criminal records check on persons who possess medical marijuana registry identification card and to revoke card issued to person convicted of felony involving controlled substance.

In effect it will (1) Require background checks for all new OMMP card applicants, as well as background checks of all existing OMMP cardholders -- approximately 80,000 people; which would cost a whole lot and gain nothing

for we, the people, but profit the prison / "justice" system special interests putting this thing forward. And (2) Would deny or revoke the OMMP card of any new or existing OMMP cardholders for any past felony involving a controlled substance; effectively denying them medicine - in some cases the only one that works - for their crime, as a part of their punishment. To what gain to society, we're not clear on yet, but intend to ask the proponents at all levels.

We can make a statement by our numbers so please try to attend Hearings and such, even if you don't plan to testify. You can also always just go up and say "ditto" to a previous speaker!

They are mostly hearing from law enforcement, and other special interests, so you are needed to counter the deliberate misinformation. • Oregon State > House Bill 2674 Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00. Presession filed (at the request of House Interim Committee on Judiciary) -- Relating to possession of controlled substances; declaring an emergency.

> Reduces possession of user quantity of controlled substance in Schedules I and II to Class A misdemeanor. Punishes by maximum of one year's imprisonment, \$6,250 fine, or both. Defines 'user quantity' as quantity of controlled substance that is less than quantities listed in ORS 475.900 (2)(b) and possession of which is not commercial drug offense.

> Declares emergency, effective on passage.

> Authorizes issuance of concealed handgun license to person convicted or diverted for certain marijuana offenses in another jurisdiction, if conviction or diversion is equivalent to conviction or diversion that does not operate as bar to obtaining license under Oregon law.

> Expands class of marijuana convictions that do not operate as bar to obtaining concealed handgun license to include misdemeanor conviction for possession of marijuana that was committed before possession of less than ounce was made punishable solely by fine under Oregon law.

More Bad and some downright Ugly News, Remember these clowns come next election cycle!

Bill Oregon State > House 3202 Sponsored by Representatives ESQUIVEL, GARRARD: Representatives HANNA, KRIEGER, MATTHEWS, SCHAUFLER, SPRENGER, THATCHER, Senator ATKINSON -- Relating to medical use of marijuana and one that makes significant changes to the OMMP. Modifies provisions of Oregon Medical Marijuana Act. SUMMARY of some of the items:

- Removes caregivers; Appears to eliminate the caregiver designation altogether
- Removes anyone under 18 years of age.
- Increases the time since a felony drug conviction until a person may be a designated grower from 5 to 15 years
- Changes the requirement that an "attending physician" can authorize cards to new requirement that a patients "primary care physician" issue approval
- LE would be given lists of growers by OHA.
- Growers would have to agree to inspection by LE.
- LE would be authorized to remove all plants, product and equipment if a grower is not in compliance (as opposed to removing the amts exceeding OMMA limits).
- Changes plant limits to two mature and two seedlings and possession to one ounce.
- Removes what little affirmative defense there is all-together.
- Drastically changes the composition of the ACMM. And more.

Dear Rep. Esquivel,

I must tell you I am very disappointed in your attempt to destroy the OMMA. It has been key in lowering the amount of opiate drugs I need to take for arthritis racked body. I am a US Navy combat veteran from the Vietnam era, a father and grandfather, a retired/disabled Master Honda Technician and am getting by on my social security check.

When the People of Oregon passed the OMMA in 1998 it was thought that very few people would need or want to use cannabis as medicine, since then it has seen much greater use than was thought possible because many more people found they got better relief from their multiple symptoms than the PhARMA drugs prescribed with far fewer bad side effects.

It has saved millions of dollars that the State would otherwise have used to help support people unable to live in their own homes. Alterations to the Program, like with HB3202, will raise the cost to the State and the Oregon Health Authority, the State Police and everyone on the program.

from the General Fund as a matter of fact it has put "excess" funds into the GF, helping close shortfalls in the budget, rather than fundina improvements in the program's function and quality of service. Limiting the program will make it much more expensive for all patients on the program. Many patients require more than one ounce a month in order to be able to medicate with edibles made with cannabis rather than smoking it. My own needs are greater than the limits you recommend and will drive me into the black market that we are all trying to fight.

Please educate yourself more on the actual consequences of reforming the OMMA that your bill will destroy. The law enforcement agencies trying to influence you are upset with the citizens trying to legislate on their own regarding what is perceived as a bad law, the prohibition of cannabis for all purposes. Our LEOs are getting a bit to the outer edges of proper use of their time, coming up with multiple bad ideas regarding cannabis and wasting your time trying to get them into law. We have voted more than once to keep the OMMA and law enforcement has come to the Legislature every year saying, it's an emergency, the sky is falling or will fall, unless we do this, this and this!

The citizens elected you to see that the money they sent to the Oregon government is properly used and no harm is caused to Oregonians by passing malicious laws. This borders on that! LEO has repeatedly over stated the problems they perceive and attempted to make the OMMA untenable to those enrolled in the program.

Please rethink your bill and your support for the OMMA. It really does work for those using it within the law as currently written and those violating the law are getting caught already.

### Medical Marijuana Advocates File Briefs in Federal Court Opposing Disclosure of Private Patient Records

#### Michigan Attorney General Bill Schuette, an opponent of medical marijuana, is willing to comply with court order

Grand Rapids, MI -- The country's leading medical marijuana advocacy group, Americans for Safe Access (ASA), filed an amicus "friend of the court" brief today defending the privacy rights of patients across the U.S. The federal Michigan Department case U.S. ν. of Community Health is the result of the Justice Department seeking private patient records from the state's medical marijuana program. Last June, the federal Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) subpoenaed the private records of 7 state-registered patients, but after the Department of Community Health (DCH) refused to turn over the documents based on provisions in Michigan's medical marijuana law, the Obama Administration took the state to court.

"Patient privacy is an important ethical and public health issue of our time, regardless of whether patients benefits from the use of medical marijuana," said ASA Chief Counsel Joe Elford, author of the amicus brief filed today. "We must do everything we can to protect that right to privacy, especially for medical marijuana patients who remain vulnerable due to an outdated federal law." Following the subpoenas for patient records, the DEA conducted raids in July and December of last year, targeting several state-compliant patient cultivators. No one was indicted as a result of the raids, but the DEA claims to be engaged in an ongoing investigation. Visit http://www.safeaccessnow.org/article.php?id= 6252 - for more.
